





Don Barbour: 50 Years Later

Where was Don Barbour's music headed? October 5th is the 50th anniversary of Don's tragic death. He had just begun his recording career as a single. "The Solo Voice of Don Barbour" would be released on Capitol Records soon after his death at 34.

The history of jazz is filled with "What if?" questions. What if Bird hadn't been such an addict? What if Bix hadn't been such a boozer? What if Chet Baker hadn't been so, well, wasted. These "What if?" questions in jazz all ask the same thing: how would their music have evolved if they hadn't died so young. 50 years after "The Solo Voice of Don Barbour," Four Freshmen fans still have questions about Don and his music.

"Solo Voice" had a different Don Barbour vocal approach than Four Freshmen fans had heard during the 1950s. Don was the group's featured solo vocalist, beginning with their first recording sessions. Indeed, Baltimore Oriole, the only song from Don's Freshmen years repeated on "Solo Voice," was apparently the first track ever recorded by the Freshmen. Capitol Records files say the recording took place April 14, 1950 at the WMGM radio studios in New York City. That take on Baltimore Oriole remained unissued until the Mosaic box set in 2000. Nearly three years later Baltimore Oriole was recorded again and issued as the flip side of Poinciana. Don's vocal spotlighted his powerful baritone that seemed to jump out of our radio speakers in those years. On "Solo Voice" Baltimore Oriole is given a more subdued approach. That's true of much of that album.

When soloing with the Freshmen, Don could certainly be considered a jazz singer. Listen to Don's vocal interplay with Bob Flanigan's trombone on Circus. 1952's Stormy Weather swings hard! Or check out Don on both the 1950 studio take and the 1958 "In Person" track of Billy Eckstine's Mr. B's Blues. That's jazz. Heck, that's soul! Don may have been the first blue-eyed soul singer, doing vocally throughout the 1950s what Bill Medley & Bobby Hatfield of the Righteous Brothers would do in the mid-1960s.

But "Solo Voice" isn't jazz or blues. "Solo Voice" is a really good album of that era filled with what the liner notes call "jazz-inflected popular singing." It is decidedly a pop vocal album. Bob Bain wrote the charts and had cats like Shelly Manne, Al Viola and Jimmy Hendrickson on the band. Don and company come close to cutting loose on *Cry Me a River* and *While You Are Gone* but most of the time the musical atmosphere is restrained, when compared with Don's Freshmen solos. The jazz inflections and the soul are missing from "Solo Voice." It was obviously a decision made by Don and producer Dave Cavanaugh.

So, where was Don's music going? Personally, I like to believe that Don would have returned to belting the type of blues-tinged uptempo songs we loved in the 1950s and still love today. Two of the premier male singers of that era, Frank Sinatra and Sammy Davis, Junior, were both adding harder edges to their uptempo songs. Don could have done it, but, sadly, we'll never know.

This is the 50th anniversary of the death of another brilliant young jazz musician. Most of us don't remember, or ever heard of, Scott LaFaro. I became interested in him two years ago when I began serious listening to Bill Evans and discovered "Sunday at the Village Vanguard," a spectacular reissue of a brilliant Orrin Keepnews production from June 25, 1961. The music is by Evans' most remarkable trio, featuring LaFaro on bass and Paul Motian on drums. The trio was determined to be a true "group," and not just a piano player with a rhythm section. They succeeded. LaFaro, at 25, does things on the bass that hadn't been heard before and probably haven't been heard since. The listener keeps asking, "How did he do that?" Scott LaFaro died in a car crash 10 days after this amazing album was recorded. I highly recommend "Sunday at the Village Vanguard."

What if? What if Don Barbour and Scott LaFaro had not died too early just as their music-making abilities were beginning to peak? We can ask the same question about Clifford Brown. This is the 55th anniversary of his untimely death at age 25. The Washington Post called him "the most brilliant trumpet player of his generation" in a recent major article observing the anniversary. This writer agrees.

The Post said of Clifford Brown, "His music endures, full of joy." That is also true of the music of Don Barbour and Scott LaFaro. We remain fortunate to have their music all of these years later.

From the Prez...

About the time I attended the Las Vegas Convention, I got back on the radar with the Four Freshmen Society and subsequently did my duties as the Arizona Rep. for a time, then; as Southwest Regional Director, I found myself hooked on the aura of the Four Freshmen Society and really became a "believer". We moved to Las Vegas later and at the time the current four guys were getting it "together". I had the pleasure of Bob Flanigan's friendship as a result of selling more and more CDs etc., and we all shared a Saturday gathering at our condo in Las Vegas that included 6 Freshmen and some 40 members and friends. Who would have expected that? It felt good. Barb felt the same.

For one reason or another we left Las Vegas for Toledo and took up residence. There we decided that we would ask the Board for permission to produce a convention. During that time I spent a year or so as Publicist for IVI then along came Tom Purvis who asked if I was interested in being President of FFS. We talked of our wish to produce a convention in Toledo. This conversation took place in Toledo. Barbara and I began to make plans for the 2011 Convention. After accepting the Presidency, I backed off the Convention chair and Barbara became the Convention Chair. I was relegated to "entertainment chairman" reporting to her. This is where I recognized that here was the last item on my bucket list. It was to produce two shows with the Four Freshmen and the Toledo Jazz Orchestra featuring the music of my favorite bandleader, Stan Kenton and favorite vocal group, The Four Freshmen. The timing here was perfect-Stan Kenton's 100th birthday. Everything was going along, people registering, food getting ordered, music was coming in place, lights, Eric, again "the audio guy" agreed to join us again. The Hotel and Seagate Center convention facilities were cooperative and all were looking up. Then terror almost swept us off our feet, 5 months before the dates, Dr Bob Flanigan dies! Oh my God! We held our breath. We discovered only a few cancellations but more reservations kept coming. Whew!

Meanwhile, Dr Ross Barbour was weaker and so on, and in August, he died. Oh My God! Now what? Cancellations? Disaster? The economy was tanking but you know, you all stood firm and we had our FFS Convention on Sept. 8-10, 2011. Barb and I were extremely worried what would come next.

In spite of the 2 major losses, you all came to celebrate our fallen stars, the Four Freshmen and Toledo Jazz Orchestra. And what a show it was! Great music, great food, great rooms, and most importantly what a responsive audience! Barbara, your Chairwoman, and I thank you for attending the Holy Toledo Convention. It was so much fun and memorable.

Next year we'll be in Reno, Nevada, where, the attendance will increase and we'll get together again. Read your "Fresh News" on the Internet and hard copies for information as it becomes available. Don't miss it!






Robert Lininger of Sharpsburg, on Monday, Passed away on October

Dennis J. Grillo (bottom left in picture), 81, of Las Vegas, passed away Oct. 31, 2011. He grew up in Brooklyn, N.Y., and graduated with high honors at Juliard School of Music. He later served in the U.S. Army. He was a jazz composer and arranger who worked with numerous bands. He was a singer for the Four Freshman Vocal Group and also played flugelhorn and trumpet in several well-known orchestras including Russ Morgan, Freddy Martin and Stan Kenton. He was one of the Four Freshman where he sang the third part in the harmonies from



1977 to 1982 before taking over the fourth part when Ken Albers retired. Dennis finally became a professor in the Berkley College of Music in Boston, where he retired. He is survived by his sons, Dante R. Grillo of Las Vegas (caretaker for his father), Sunny K.

Composer Pete Rugolo dies at 95

Pete Rugolo, an Emmy-winning, Grammy-nominated composer and arranger whose TV themes included "The Fugitive" and "Run for Your Life," died Sunday of age-related causes in Sherman Oaks, California. He was 95.

Rugolo was one of the architects of the sound of Stan Kenton's big band in the 1940s and 1950s and both produced and titled the legendary "Birth of the Cool" sessions for Miles Davis and Gil Evans.

He arranged for dozens of jazz artists including Peggy Lee, Mel Torme, Harry Belafonte, June Christy, Nat King Cole, Patti Page and the Four Freshmen.

Rugolo was a staff composer and arranger at MGM during the early 1950s, contributing orchestrations to such films as "Skirts Ahoy," "Latin Lovers," "Easy to Love" and "Kiss Me Kate." He later wrote original scores for films including "Jack the Ripper," "The Sweet Ride" and "Chu Chu and the Philly Flash."

For most of his career in Hollywood, Rugolo was active as a composer in TV. He penned the theme for the TV-series version of "The Thin Man" and went on to write themes and jazz-based scores for "Richard Diamond, Private Detective," "Thriller," "Felony Squad," "The Outsider," "Cool Million" and "Jigsaw John."

His most famous TV music was probably the theme and extensive library of music for "The Fugitive," although his weekly music for "Run for Your Life" -- also in the mid-1960s -- earned him three consecutive Emmy nominations. He won two Emmys: for 1970 telepic "The Challengers" and for a 1971 episode of "The Bold Ones."

He also wrote music for episodes of "Leave It to Beaver," "The Alfred Hitchcock Hour," "Alias Smith and Jones," "Family" and "Carter Country."

Rugolo's other TV credits included the telefilms "Sam Hill" and "Jordan Chance" and miniseries "The Last Convertible," which earned him a final Emmy nomination. He came out of retirement in 1997 to score a final feature: "This World, Then the Fireworks."

He was born in Sicily in 1915; his family moved to California when he was 5. He earned a degree from San Francisco State College and went on to study with Darius Milhaud at Mills College (which, in the 1930s, was an otherwise all-female institution).

It was after his Army service during WWII that he joined the Kenton band, eventually writing more than 100 compositions for the bandleader. His sole Grammy nomination was for contributing to Kenton's 1964 album "Artistry in Voices and Brass."

In addition to his studio work, Rugolo served as a musical director at Capitol Records in the late 1940s and at Mercury Records in the late 1950s and early 1960s. He also led his own jazz band for a short stint in the 1950s.

Rugolo won the Golden Score Award from the American Society of Music Arrangers and Composers in 1993 and was honored by the L.A. Jazz Institute in 2002.

Survivors include his wife Edye, three children and three grandchildren. Funeral services were private, with a public memorial tat a later date. The family has requested contributions to the ASMAC-Pete Rugolo Scholarship for Big Band Arranging.


