# Forgotten Vocalists of Pop and Jazz

So many authors have written about early jazz instrumentalists, and to a lesser extent solo vocalists, but rarely, if at all, have the great vocal trios and quartets of the past been included in their texts. This is a distorted view of America's music from the 1920s to about 1960.

Many of the early vocal groups were as equally talented and important as their instrumental counterparts; yet, these vocal groups continue to be ignored or overlooked in books about American music. The musicianship of these early singers had to be excellent, as their arrangements, many of which were very complex, were performed by memory as opposed to performing while reading sheet music on stands. Also, some groups included choreography in their acts while singing, further challenging the singers.

Early vocal groups, such as the Boswell Sisters, the Mills Brothers, and the Ravens dramatically helped bring about the acceptance of jazz, as their music appealed to national and international audiences, evidenced by the popularity of their recordings.

One of the most interesting, jazziest, and influential of these groups was the Four Freshmen, a group that has been viable from 1948 to the present time. This group remarkably continues to thrill audiences via concerts or recordings. Along the way their music has strongly influenced such groups as the Hi-Los, Manhattan Transfer, and The Beach Boys, to mention a few.
