It is with great love for the Freshmen Sound that I share with you these observations.

Through the years, in addition to the great arrangements and the heart with which they were sung, many "show biz" vehicles have been used by the various groups to keep the Freshmen working....humor, personality, adapting pop tunes to the Freshmen style, instrumental gimicks, etc. ....but all with two purposes in mind: to keep on going so this music wouldn't fade away, and, to perfect The Sound.

In my "never to be humble" opinion the perfection goal has finally been reached with Group 22. Not some songs, not most songs, but with every chord in every song they sing on stage. I have witnessed this several times since these guys have been together.

Also, the instrumental work is exemplary and their personalities are friendly and charming. Through the years, through the various group changes, I have heard greatness in the recordings and through the speakers. Usually, the harmonies were wonderful and the passion was genuine. However, I have never heard The Sound perfected un til Group 22. The way these four gentlemen interact on and off the stage is also examplary. They are friends and ambassadors of jazz, and everyone who meets them absolutely loves them.

I believe the Freshmen will achieve big notoriety with a younger generation if we can get them booked into more colleges and jazz festivals. I'm concentrating on that.
