The Evergreen Aviation Museum exhibits 75 other historic airplanes including a 1903 Wright Flyer as well as an SR-71 "Blackbird". Hundreds of exhibits will fascinate you and the "Spruce Goose Café" is a great refueling stop.

If you choose to tour to the East of Portland you will find Mt. Hood and the beautiful Timberline Lodge. Hand crafted by WPA artisans, Timberline Lodge is an all-seasons reflection of Mt. Hood's Majesty. The peoples lodge was hewn by public workers into a monumental masterpiece and dedicated by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt on September 27, 1937. Today, a National Historic Landmark, Timberline is finished with museum quality original paintings, carved linoleum, mosaic glass, sculptured wood, stone and metal work. Year 'round, nearly two million visitors make this their mountain home away from home.

Just slightly over an hour's drive to the North is Mt. St. Helens the only active volcano in the lower 48 states. This one of the most popular tourist sites in the area and in the years since the eruption, that attracted worldwide attention, the area has been transformed into a tourist paradise, not with carnivals and glitter but with great natural beauty and all the convenience facilities anyone wants or needs.

If you choose to travel a little farther to the West you can see the famous Oregon Coast and wade in the great Pacific Ocean. Oregon boasts one of the most beautiful and rugged coastlines anywhere and there are many quaint towns to visit along the way.
