



# FRESH VALENTINES IN WISCONSIN!

Four Freshmen Society living legend John Bangs was at the February FF concert in Door County, Wisconsin. John (L) chatted with veteran FF fourth voice & drummer Bob Ferreira after the show. John, the founder of the FFS Music Mart, is Chairman of the Board Emeritus, former Board Chair and long-time President of the Four Freshmen Society. He attended the concert with FFS Wisconsin representative Mike McCoy and FFS Board member Wayne Corey. John recruited Mike and Wayne to the then-fledgling FFS in 1991.

Three songs never recorded by Four Freshmen Group #22 were highlights of the Valentine's Eve show in Door County, Wisconsin. A small but enthusiastic Fish Creek audience welcomed the Freshmen to a venue that has through the years seen headlines Harry Belafonte, Roseanne Cash, Smothers Brothers, Second City, George Winston and, more than a decade ago, the Four Freshmen.

Door County, a northeast Wisconsin peninsula sandwiched between Lake Michigan and Green Bay (the bay, not the football city), is a tourist haven much of the year but can lie quiet under a beautiful blanket of snow mid-winter. That's why the Freshmen were there for Valentine's weekend. The Door Community Auditorium wanted topnotch entertainment for couples making a winter weekend getaway. The couples got their weekend getaway, the snow covering and the topnotch entertainment.

In "This Whole Wide World, I Remember You" and "Give Me the Simple Life" are Freshmen favorites never recorded commercially by Group #22. "Wide World" and "I Remember You" seemed to really thrill the audience, with the stunning chords opening "Wide World," and the 'distant bell' really ringing out in "I Remember You." Fan

favorites including It's a "Blue World," "Route 66," "Poinciana" and "Angel Eyes" wowed a crowd that came to hear the hits. They heard 'em!

The Freshmen followed opening standup Minneapolis comic C. Willi Myles with 17 songs in a 60 minute set. The Four Freshmen Society-Wisconsin hosted a pre-show reception and dinner. Freshmen Vince Johnson joined fans for the post-concert "afterglow" at The Landmark Resort where FF and FFS members spent the weekend.

A highlight for the Freshmen and FFS members was the attendance of John Bangs, legendary FFS official. John founded the FFS Music Mart, is responsible for many of the Four Freshmen CD releases through Collectors' Choice Music, was a longtime president of FFS and is currently Board Chairman Emeritus. Health issues have curtailed his FFS convention attendance in recent years but fan club members were thrilled to have him with us in Door County.

## **BRIAN EICHENBERGER'S POP MASTERPIECE**

I like Ike. A lot.

Whoops, make that "iKE." The name of Brian Eichenberger's new project may have had some twists and turns on the way to "iKE" but the music on "One" is a straight-ahead joy to hear. And yes, the name is spelled with a small "i" and capital "KE." iKE. Brian says it was sort of a nickname, "Back in the day…"

It was going to be a five player band and be called Eich Five. But there were never really five players, and there was never really a band. Amazon.com sells the CD by Eich Five, but the name on the CD quickly morphed into "iKE," as "iKE" it has remained.

One is a pop/rock album. Let there be no misunderstanding: a member of the Four Freshmen has written and recorded a pop/rock album and it is filled with absolute musical joy. Brian says it's comprised of ten of his best original tunes. The music may come as a surprise or a shock to some Freshmen fans, but it just demonstrates again the remarkable array of talent that exists within the Four Freshmen group #22.

Your reviewer is not an expert on pop/rock, but I know good music when I hear it. Hoping to overcome an obvious personal bias when it comes to work by any member of the Four Freshmen, I enlisted the analysis of

two people whose ears and tastes I really respect. They concurred. "One" is all killer, no filler.

Brian wrote all of the songs and plays most of the instruments. Group #20's "Still Fresh" CD documented his keyboard chops. "One" offers conclusive proof. We also hear him on multiple guitars and bass. Twin Cities musician Tait Cameron does the drums and percussion work, while CD producer Jon Herchert adds guitar on three tracks. Rebecca Sorensen is the added voice on "Ghost Band."

Brian can write and perform pop/rock music at an extraordinarily high level. With Herchert, he has also brought remarkable engineering and production skills to this project. Noted rock writer Susan Masino cited "great production" that, combined with the songwriting, makes the album "very commercial."

"He's got a couple of hits on here," Masino told me. She should know. She is the author of the definitive biography of AC/DC, "Let There Be Rock" and counts the late Wizard of Waukesha, Les Paul, among her many musical friends.

Four Freshmen fans believe they know what Brian sounds like and, indeed, we do. But this is different music with a different sound. Like many artists, Brian appears influenced by much of the music he has heard through the years. Expert ears hear other influences when they listen to "One." Sting, lead vocalist for The Police, is most often mentioned. Repeated listening to the CD suggests influence from numerous pop performers including Jack Johnson and Prince. Brian may have been influenced by many, but there is nothing in the music that is derivative. The end result is a distinctive sound that is distinctly "iKE."

Favorite "One" tracks are in the ear of the beholder. Susan Masino picked "One Thing," "When You're Gone" and "Anybody Out There." Singer Christopher Corey, after months of repeat listening, named "If I Gave You My Heart" and "Still," the latter a lovely song about a relationship of many years. This writer is fond of everything on the CD but I especially enjoy "Still" and the rocking "Rebecca."

Any analysis of Brian's CD must include a comment on the final track, "Ghost Band." Yes, it is obviously about Brian's day job, so to speak. The opening line says, "Way back before we were born, we used to be really big." His tongue remains firmly in cheek for the remainder of the track about "the sound that never dies." Some Freshmen fans chuckle when they hear "Ghost Band." Others may not. Personally, I think the song is a lighthearted look at Brian's main musical life since 1996. Thanks to FF group #22, the Freshmen sound is "the sound that never dies."

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"One" can be purchased through www.iKEmusic.com for \$10 or downloaded for \$5. It's a bargain! "One" is a stunning accomplishment, the opening solo volley from an artist and concept that this listener hopes will lead to much more. We want Brian in the Four Freshmen beyond any doubt. But this writer also wishes him the solo success that his immense talent deserves.

I am finally sitting down at my computer to write you a letter. I wanted to thank you, your sons, and your staff for such an enjoyable experience on the above mentioned cruise. This was my first experience on a cruise ship. I was attracted to participate because of the music.

I had never seen or heard the latest "Four Freshmen" group before. This was a strong factor in my decision to experience my first cruise ship as this group was scheduled as part of the music available. I was further influenced by the number of very talented jazz musicians listed in the lineup, not the least of whom was Johnny Mandel who I was aware was a significant composer and arranger, especially for movie soundtracks.

The Jazz Cruise was a musically exciting experience. The peak music experience for me was in seeing and listening to the "Four Freshmen" I was very impressed that this group sounded as good, if not better, live as any of the recordings of them I have heard. I felt the intonation of their voices was superb, the harmony balanced and full, and the phrasing and enunciation of their words was very precise. The evening when this group performed with the large band has to be my favorite, which I believe included the group singing with a five trombone backup.

I really enjoyed the talent and sound from the large band made up of the jazz performers. The band was certainly made up of so many jazz soloists highly talented and capable of presenting interesting solos, technically performed, but expressive and melodic.

Additionally, the jazz combo sessions made up of the "all star musicians" I found exciting and enjoyable, and I tried to attend each if not all of these, which kept me busy trying to plan ahead for each day.

I was impressed with Ken Peplowski, the consummate reed instrument player. I don't believe I had seen or heard him before the cruise. He has such a command of reed instruments, and his organizational skills appear to be essential for the Jazz Cruise. I left the cruise with a high appreciation and regard for his musical talent and skills.

I have several friends who have experienced cruise ships. I was warned by them that the meals on these ships were of gourmet quality. I now understand what they were telling me. I found the dining experiences memorable, with every meal of high quality and very tasty. I had the opportunity to try some meals which I had never eaten before the cruise. Now I am trying to reduce my calorie intake to compensate for the week of gourmet delight on the Jazz Cruise. Not easy for me!

I am happy I participated on the Jazz Cruise. It was a musically exciting experience for me and I have pleasant memories of the week of jazz music, each day of which I found resulted in a musical high for me.

## REFLECTIONS

## of the Four Freshmen

A few years ago while attending the FFS Pittsburgh Convention and partaking in Ross's Freshmen Wannabes, the lady next to me politely turned and said, "You really know all their songs?"

"Well ma'am, I've been a Freshmen Fan for most of my life and how about you?" That nice lady turned out to be Sue Barbour, Ross's wife. They both embraced me with Frosh anecdotes for the remainder of that convention.

The following year in Indianapolis after seeing Ross and Sue, I made available a copy of my Fresh News story - published almost 20 years ago - on how I became a Freshman Fan. After a good review they sent it back asking me to revise it for re-publication. So, with some changes to the original this is how the Freshmen greatly influenced my life and my own music career.

It was a July afternoon more than 50 years ago, and I was counting the days to when I'd be leaving the Dominican Sisters in their convent/children's home in the suburbs of New York City. I'd spent all of my childhood there, and upon approaching my 17th birthday, I looked forward to my enlistment in the Air Force. Listening to the radio while mopping the convent's dormitory floor, a song came on with an interpretation I'd never heard before. The music so moved me that I actually dropped the mop and put my ear to the speaker to hear the rest of "Day by Day" as I habitually took interest in an unusual and distinguished musical score. The early memories of my mother's beautiful singing voice, being a choir boy and over the years with many school performances, song sessions with the other convent kids along with playing bugle in the fife and drum band had consumed me with a love of music.

"Day by Day's" new sound with the Latin arrangement was so original that I was disappointed when the DJ didn't announce the name of the group. The song stuck with me for days as I longed to hear it again. My early exposure to Latin rhythms was the hushed singing of the convent's homesick Latino kids pining for their homes and families. Whenever the band equipment was distributed, the instrument tuneups turned into a whimsical impromptu Latin music session on those very elementary instruments. That is until the convent prefect shouted, "OK you guys cut that out, this ain't Puerto Rico, fall into your marching positions."

Back then, Latin rhythms were rarely heard on mainstream radio. Now the Samba, Rhumba, Mambo, and exciting Latin rhythms were being introduced to a wider audience. Trumpets, conga drums, cow bells, and artists like Perez Prado, Tito Puente and others were changing the sounds that were expanding American popular music. This was how I took note of that catchy Latin sound and those harmonic voices in "Day by Day" that hooked me. When finally I heard the song again the announcer mentioned the group as the "Four Freshmen." The other convent kids hadn't heard of them yet, but you can believe I made sure that the record would be put on the jukebox's waiting list in the diner where we all gathered after caddying on weekends. Unfortunately, I joined the Air Force before I would ever hear it played there.

During my basic training at Sampson Air Base, I got my first weekend pass for Rochester, NY. Waiting for the Greyhound bus, I heard the jukebox blaring out "Day by Day," and I rushed back to play it again and again. Missing my bus and having to wait three hours for the next bus, the ticket attendant wasn't too pleased after hearing that song for the tenth time in the now empty station. Upon arrival at the Rochester USO, the hostess was giving out tickets for the evening events. I mentioned to her the song I'd heard by the Four Freshmen. She told me how she too loved the group and that they sang a song in a movie that was playing in town called "Lucy Gallant." You can imagine where I spent my first evening! In the film I heard the flip side of "Day by Day" called "How can I tell her." The soft vocal harmony on this song was also a new exciting discovery for me.

Until then, I had no personal outlet, for every moment of my life had been a demanding regimen restricted and accounted for to the authorities in the convent/home and now the military. This was a landmark day when I could determine my own artistic interpretation and a search for music that would shape my future. Afterwards, sharing my enthusiasm with my service buddies I would learn for the first time the great catalogue of music that had bypassed me in my early life. Subsequently, I was to learn the Four Freshmen had been around for some time.

My next assignment was Sheppard Field in Wichita Falls, Texas for Tech School. There I was able to buy my first record player, and "Day by Day" was my first record. The music store in town carried several other Freshmen singles including "Blue World" and "Voices in Modern." The sales clerk ordered an album in the EP version to fit my record player, the just released "Four Freshmen and Five Trombones." That album, with its extraordinary musicianship, captivated me forever to the Freshmen sound which had expanded my musical tastes, and where in a very short time I learned the words to every song. I held a secret passion to be an entertainer and now studied the ever increasing Freshmen discography and their musical discipline as a guide for my own budding profession. In the service, I was probably viewed as something of a nuisance as I tried out my singing talents at every opportunity where a band was setting up or on stage. Obviously, I lacked a musical business sense but nobody told me I shouldn't try and more often I was asked to sing. There were also those service club talent shows where I harmonized with Freshmen-style Wannabes and other vocal groups.

During this period, there was an introduction of so many new promising vocal groups. I still remember The Tattle Tales, The Hi-Lo's, the Kenton Presents Series with Al Belleto Sextet, even the Mexican group "Los Tres Ases" and other groups that slip my memory right now.

That was the time of the "Elvis Spring," especially in Texas. Now, there was a cross section of music if ever there was one! Both Elvis and the Freshmen came to Wichita Falls that spring, albeit weeks apart. Well! My first concert ever was some experience for this 17-year-old former convent kid. Along with

the Freshmen, on the bill were the Ted Health Orchestra, June Christy, and Nat King Cole. After the show, I bypassed the adoring throng that surrounded Nat Cole and elatedly helped the Freshmen pack up in the auditorium and roll their equipment out to the bus. My conversation with Ross Barbour and the rest of the Freshmen just about bubbled the starch out of my khaki uniform. I even got to meet June Christy, who called me "a cute soldier!" Performing one night stands, the tour would continue across the endless highways of Texas. In a publication I discovered called "Variety," I would read about that famous "Road Show," and follow their schedule across Texas and the Deep South. I was envious of their opportunity to travel almost everywhere they had a waiting devoted audience while my passion for adventurous artistic freedom was still restricted. Years later, I mentioned this story to Bob Flanigan who still remembered me and his words were: "Oh, God, back then I thought we'd never get out of Texas."

After my military service, I explored the country in various jobs and tried out my singing and vocal impersonation skills at every potential opportunity while I visited the cities to catch the Freshmen performing thus acquiring new repertoire. Eventually, I found myself a student at Los Angeles City College and later at L.A. State where I occasionally sang with the college bands. Always in possession of my collection of Freshmen singles and albums, this was the time Jim Pike was interested in me as a member of his newly forming group "The Lettermen." Slowly, I was being taken seriously, and the musical director at State told me I sounded very much like the upand-coming much talked about jazz guitarist and singer Frank D'Rone. When I learned that Frank was a regular performer in San Francisco, I made frequent trips up to see him. Though unknown to Frank then, he was a great inspiration and my secret vocal mentor. Over time, my determination and rising self confidence paid off with my own musical talent seeking its own audience. With my new bride Suzy, we set sail for Europe to hone this talent.

I worked there for years as a musician and singer in various clubs, hotels, casinos, military bases and European tourists' resorts in Spain and North Africa. I was often invited to perform in the Soviet bloc countries. My repertoire included songs in German and Italian. Meeting with Soviet students there, I found a great hunger for western style jazz and music and discussed Willis Conover's jazz program on "The Voice of America Radio." The Freshmen were a regular feature in Europe on the Armed Forces Radio and Radio Luxemburg, sandwiched between the new British Pop, Motown and a rising clamor for American Country music. The adventure of this business to

pursue a "gig" regardless of where it was offered had me accepting offers to perform in the Far East and some exposure to their growing color TV industry. In time, I was producing my own shows and booking reviews far and wide. Returning home, I toured Alaska and then down to South America.

After all, I chose this career to experience the world, and often more than 25 years of performing on the road, cruise ships and as master of ceremonies, entertainment director at holiday resorts I reviewed the wisdom gained from my whirlwind encounters. Eventually, I relished some domestic stability, taking less demanding work to administer performing arts. I changed careers.

My biggest regret is that period of time when I lost touch with the Freshmen as they changed personnel and recording labels and the industry technology changed. Then years later, the Capitol Collectors Series was released and I found out about the great work of John Bangs and the FF AS. There was the tremendous support of the FFS staff and friends of the Freshmen who were always eager to extend themselves. Our dedicated Chick Trafford would call my home whenever the Freshmen were quickly scheduled in the area. I was teaching ESL in China and contacted Yas Ichiura in Japan asking him to send me a hard to find CD and he came through. When I couldn't find any CD recordings on Frank D'Rone, the FFS put me in touch with the incomparable Paul Halac, who has everything ever recorded by Frank along with a priceless collection of Americas favorite artists. From Paul, I learned to my delight that Frank still performs in the Chicago area.

Looking back at my own life, it was indeed the music of the Freshmen giving me my first experience of discovering and exploring on my own, their unique style and musical expression which nonetheless continues to influence so many artists and vocal groups. I never forget that I was one of them. Two of my sons continue my legacy with their own groups: One performs in California and on occasion Las Vegas, while the other performs in Vermont and the eastern region.

Now as a teacher and historian, I operate motor coach tours all over the country and Canada. You can be sure whenever I have the appropriate crowd and the moment presents itself, I slip in a Freshmen CD and there is always someone who can start up an exciting conversation of our favorite group. Sometimes we all lapse into a memorable sing-a-long. Ross would be proud!

I still applaud the guys who found the "sound" and the new Freshmen who continue this great American musical heritage. Now you know.


After the concert, the FF CD sales table was crowded. The club's sophisticated jazz fans bought tickets early, made the event a sellout and stuck around for postconcert conversation.

The award is named for Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong, among the fathers of Dixieland jazz and considered by many to be the past century's best trumpet player.

During the show's intermission, Bob Ferreira, senior in FF tenure, accepted the award on behalf of the group, underscoring SJC's long-time devotion to the arts and good music in the community. "It's a truly a great honor to accept this award," said Bob to heavy applause as he received the plaque from Gordon Garrett, JCS's Chairman of the Board. Long-time JCS member Jerry Roucher read an introductory tribute and profile of the FF pointing to their long history and putting them in the pantheon of jazz giants. No strangers to this audience, the Freshmen have performed numerous times to crowds in Sarasota, none more appreciative than on March 1.
