How to Organize a Jam Session By Dave Blackwell

As many of you know, I have organized and presided over the Jam Session for the Four Freshmen Society Convention for the past several years beginning in 2013 when Marlene Lobsiger and I hosted the convention in Fort Wayne, Indiana. It seemed to me that previous jam sessions wasted a lot of time by asking who wants to perform next and then getting them up to play or sing and ask the combo if they knew a certain song in a key in which the person was able to perform. It took a lot of time for the performer and the combo to agree and perform the song. This procedure made for a long night and for some performers, a less that great presentation because someone didn't know the song that was requested. Based on that assumption, I decided to get all of that done before hand.

I start by having anyone who wishes to play or sing fill out the registration form what song they want and in what key. Then I find that song in my large computer file or in my fake books or at the library. Once the song is found, it is put in my computer a note at a time. Or, if it already exists, I can take the next step which is to transfer it to the correct key for the performer. My computer program for this is called Band-In-A-Box. You type in the chord symbols and either type or play the melody from a synthesizer keyboard so it

appears on the screen with the chords. This is called a lead sheet. Once the music is in the computer it is a simple matter to press a button and change the key. The next step is to print three copies of the music (one for piano, bass, and drum set).

I set a cut-off date and at that time I make a list of all the performers, their instrument or voice and the title of their song. It's usually one song per person. Then I take that list and make a program order, so everyone knows when they are performing during the evening. I try to vary the performers by instrument and voice so there are not so many of the same kind in a row. Then some special numbers are added. The current and Former Four Freshmen are always welcome to perform as they often have in the past. In recent years I have added an opening (continued on page 11)
