Tribute to a True Freshmen Fan

On April 30, I lost one of my long-time friends, Babs Frederich. We both were in our early teens when we were captivated by the unique, haunting sound of the Four Freshmen! Babs, who lived in Cleveland, started one of the first local FF fan clubs in the early 1950s and, because of her talents and enthusiasm, soon became national vice-president of "The Freshies."

In 1954, I inquired about starting a Freshmen fan club in Pittsburgh and began receiving letters from Babs (all her correspondence ended in "Forever More for the Four"). This was the start of a long-lasting friendship. Our families met and exchanged several visits between Cleveland and Pittsburgh in those early years.

In 1957, Bill Wagner became the group's personal manager and reorganized the Four Freshmen fan club. He launched the first-ever newsletter, called "The Fifth Freshman." Babs Pleischl was appointed national president, and Dot Matviya became national vice-president. This newsletter was the main connection between the Freshmen and their fans for over twenty years. In the meantime, Babs married Wayne Frederich and moved to Tallahassee, FL.

Much later, in the 1990s, the Four Freshmen Society became the official "fan club." Babs served on the Board of FFS until 2013, when she was awarded the title of "FFS Corporate Board of Directors Emeritus."

Beginning with the original Four Freshmen (Bob, Ross, Don and Hal), Babs met and encouraged all of the FF groups, until about six years ago. She attended most of the FFS

conventions with her husband, Wayne, until he passed away on May 1, 2014.

Babs was a true and faithful Four Freshmen fan, working tirelessly to promote their music for over 60 years. She will be greatly missed by all who knew her.
