Four Freshmen Vocal Scores

Dear Freshmen Fans,

I grew up in Ashland, Kentucky and became a Four Freshmen fan in the early 1950s when I first heard one of thier recordings; But, I became even a bigger fan in 1958 when I first saw them "in person" at a Stan Kenton Road Show Concert in Columbus, Ohio.

Fans have always considered The Four Freshmen to be in a class by themselves, and to think every quartet, both amatur and professional, has desired to sing like them.

Freshmen arrangements, however, are quite challenging to perform and not easily obtainable. Through the years, though, I was able to collect several Four Freshmen vocal scores from the vast collection of David Bentley, and from The Four Freshmen themselves.

In 1995, my collection grew by leaps and bounds when I received copies of some marvelous transcripts of Four Freshmen arangements from Yasushi "Yas" Ichiura who lives in Tokyo, Japan. The transcripts were done by a friend of his, and a very talented musician, named Yutaka Alaki who lives in Nara-Shi, NARA, Japan.

It happened a few months before 1995 FFS Convention at Sawmill Creek Resort in Huron, Ohio, when the transcripts arrived with the suggestion that he, (Yas) and I, along with two others, get together to sing them privately during our stay at the convention. We needed a piano in order to get our starting pitches, but the only place we could locate one was in the public meeting area called "The Birdcage". As we started singing, other fans became involved, and The Four Freshmen "Wannabees" had its begining.

We had originally planned to sing the charts a cappella, but we became dependant upon the piano, as each singer had to strike a note here and there to stay on pitch. Finally, I sat down and started playing chords behind the vocals, and Yas began playing the instrumental solos on his valve trombone (which was formerly owned by Bob Flanigan). So, Yas and I became accompanying "orchestra" for the Four Freshmen Wannabees.

At each convention since then, the Wannabees have gathered around a piano to sing these wonderful arrangements. During that period, more transcriptions, in various forms, have been collected. But, it seems there were never enough copies, some copies had errors, some were far too complex to sing, and they were not in a consistent form. So, I, along with an Ashland friend, Jim Greenslate, took up the task of completely re-noting the charts, correcting any errors, writing out most of the intros and instrumental solos, and selecting those songs that lent themselves to group singing.
