Planning is still preliminary, but we will have much more detail information included within the January issue of Fresh News. The host hotel will be the Crowne Plaza. Mark your calendar.

There will be three seats on our Board of Directors open for election this year following the staggered expiration that was established when we incorporated in 2001. We hope that we may establish a more formal procedure for nomination and election than has been our practice in the past. I have received several suggestions that an election system be established to enable members who do not attend our conventions to participate. This will be an important item on our agenda but may not get fully defined at those brief meetings. The expiring terms are held by Past President John Bangs, Treasurer Bruce Camlin, and Secretary Donna Gallaway. These are important contributing positions within our society and therefore we must very carefully evaluate prospective candidates.

We have been accepting credit card payments for Music Mart purchases and 2003 convention registrations since last April. Generally this program has gone well; however, it develops that a significant amount of additional work is required by our volunteer staff to accommodate. We have had very little interest in the use of credit cards for payment of dues. We are analyzing our costs for these services with the view of implementing any changes necessary to support these costs. We also continue to have some security and privacy issues with this service due simply to the method of operation with a volunteer staff.
