I won't dwell on the economy except to say that during this time all of us



- 5) You can print a copy on your own printer if you want a paper copy; and, you can print only those pages that interest you.

### Yoshi's, San Francisco "A performing arts center, with a menu"

Thus did Bob Ferreira describe the venue for the Labor Day weekend concerts in SF. Not merely a jazz club, Bob told the nearly sold out crowds at the 3 concerts on Sept 5 and 6. A fine facility with great sound, great staff, and great food and drink; "... try the pot stickers... and the green drink with the whipped cream and cherry on top...", Bob chided the audience, as food was being served to attendees seated around intimate tables, during performances.

Not only was it a holiday weekend, the Bay Bridge was closed that long weekend for retro construction; so it was unknown what kind of turn out there would be for the concerts. No need to worry, as FF fans were not deterred from turning out to hear the boys. Sat and Sun night performances were sell outs; and the Sunday matinee crowd was more than half capacity. Nearly 900 heard the boys that weekend; and CDs were totally sold out.

One lady came dressed all in blue, including her lovely hat. She said later that she wanted to stand and sing with the boys during their rendition of "Little Girl Blue", and "It's a Blue World"; and she wondered why Vince didn't play the "big bass, and do more whistling".

Thanks to Y Yoshi's policy on a kid's price, there were several young children attending the Sun matinee, whose parents paid only \$5 to introduce the FF sound to their kids.

Society members Bob and Sue Goodell attended all 3 performances; while many, many in the audience raised their hands when asked, how many are attending a FF concert for the first time. Eight people in the audience became new Society members. The crush of fans at the Society table after the Sun night concert required The Four, the reps, and the expert help of lovely Jennifer, Vince's friend, to handle the rush of sales, questions and autographs.

In addition to the superb music and setting, other highlights included: Curtis's solo horn work, and his rapport with the audience, commending them for being such a large, enthusiastic group, unlike many "sleepy Sunday night audiences"; Brian's great guitar and vocal work, and his agreement with the assessment of the uniqueness of San Francisco's' non cookie cutter ambiance, saying he had his "Subway sandwich on a different kind of bread here"; and, of course, Bob's strong leadership on vocals and drums, and dealing with business details.

Next on the schedule for Northern California: April 8 at the Sacramento Community Center Theater; Apr 9 at the Napa Valley Opera House; and April 10 at the restored art deco El Campanil Theatre in Antioch.

# **'Blue Moon' Convention** Mike McCoy, FFS - Wisconsin, 9-25-09

The annual gathering of Four Freshmen alumni and fans Aug 20-22 already is being remembered in Society lore as the "'Blue Moon' Convention."

It earned that nickname at the sold-out Saturday dinner show on the convention's last night at the suburban Crowne Plaza Ravinia hotel on Atlanta's northeast side. The Four Freshmen show was nearing its end when Freshmen bass singer Bob Ferreira announced the Freshmen had a song request from someone in the audience.

Bob said Nancy Whitmire, wife of Society Treasurer James Whitmire, had asked the Freshmen earlier in the week if they would sing "Blue Moon."

Perhaps "Blue World" was intended? Regardless, to the surprise of many in the audience because it's never been a Freshmen song, Bob said they would do just that.

With Curtis, Vince and Brian doing backup vocals and instrumentation. Bob took the vocal lead on "Blue Moon" in a 1960s- and decidedly non-Freshmen style -- one perhaps at least somewhat reminiscent of the 1961 version which was a big hit for the doo-wop Marcels..

After just a few bars, Curtis was heard loudly lamenting, "I can't believe we're doing this!" Many in the chuckling audience surely understood that sentiment.

The audience laughter quickly began to build as Curtis took control of the melody with his trumpet and left Bob and the other Freshmen in his wake. .The longer Curtis played, the greater the laughter until any pretense of an ensemble performance disappeared . "Blue Moon" had turned into a brief Curtis showcase before Curtis apparently realized it was the moment the music should die.

"That answers the question whether we do 'Blue Moon'," Brian said after a brief moment of silence. Slight pause. "No."

The laughter and sustained applause from the 400plus present may have been for the good-humored Freshmen effort -- or more likely, for the unexpected comedy that came with it.

Moving on (so we thought), the Freshmen brought four Freshmen alumni, Ray Brown, Rod Henley, Ross Barbour, and Bob Flanigan to the stage for a rousing show-closing number by the now-"Eight Freshmen" singing "Day by Day."

Within just a few bars, however, Curtis took control on trumpet with a brief jazzy 'Blue Moon" riff that meshed exactly right with "Day by Day," provoking another round of audience laughter and at that moment insuring the three-day event would be recalled as the "Blue Moon Convention."

Somehow the assembled Freshmen finished "Day by Day." It was a special treat as Bob had told fans earlier in the convention he no longer sings. With that in mind., Bob was told as he was invited to the stage to join the others that he could simply mouth the words if he wished. Fortunately for the fans present, he not only sang but his distinctive voice that helped make the unique Freshmen sound clearly could be heard by those present.

Flanigan's appearance on stage was his second of the evening, the first being for the presentation of a birthday cake by Miss Georgia USA as Saturday was Bob's 83rd. He also was given a large quilt which featured as its pattern color photos of various configurations of the Freshmen and selected album covers from their 60-plus years.

It was part of the pre-show dinner program which had included the transfer of the leadership of the Four Freshmen Society from Dick Baldwin to Mel Meyers. Dick was honored with a special plaque commemorating his service and Mel delivered a short acceptance speech.

#### A Mid-Show Change

For the Saturday show, the Freshmen had planned to do their first-half performance with their standard multi-mike setup, then move to one mike for the second half, recalling the earlier years of Freshmen amplification. They started the second half with "Poinciana" but abandoned their plan after that number because of the loud music coming from a wedding party in an adjacent ballroom.

They returned to the one mike arrangement later in the program when the wedding party took a musical break and were able to finish the show following their original plan.

The Freshmen were called back for two encores by an audience unwilling for the evening and the convention to end. "We'll Be Together Again" was the first encore, while the second featured both "After You" and Ross Barbour's composition the Freshmen used for many years to close shows, "And So It's Over." (And so it was until we gather the same weekend again in 2010 at Annapolis, Maryland.)

Among the many tunes offered during the evening were several revivals. The list included "Graduation Day," "Laura," "Little Girl Blue," "Guilty," "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows," and "Give Me the Simple Life."

### 'Fresh Talk' allows for recollections

Earlier Saturday, the traditional "Fresh Talk," well attended as usual, was held for fans, with all current and past Four Freshmen alumni present in Atlanta serving as a panel taking questions from the audience.

#### Some responses:

- Bob Flanigan said of Friday night's Four Freshmen performance: "I was in awe as much as you (the fans) were."
- Asked about his memories of the late '50s era "Roadshow" tour, Bob said "Working with the Stan Kenton band was the ultimate." (The mention of Kenton was timely as the following Tuesday was the 30th anniversary of his death.)
- Asked about his earliest musical days, Bob said he started on harmonica as a child, then learned guitar. He had his first instruction in chords from listening to the "Grand Ol' Opry" radio broadcasts

- Bob also mentioned in passing that "We'll Be Together Again" was written by Billy May on back of a menu at El Rancho in Las Vegas.
- Asked about his favorite instrument, Vince Johnson said after earlier learning piano and other instruments (trombone, etc.), he now prefers whistling..
- Ross Barbour's favorite Four Freshmen song? "I Get Along Without You Very Well."
- Bob Flanigan and Autie Goodman picked as their favorite Freshmen numbers "We'll Be Together Again" as their choices. Favorites of others?: Brian Eichenberger, "There Will Never Be Another You," and Rod Henley, "Angel Eyes." Vince Johnson said there were too many to pick from. Curtis Calderon declined to pick a favorite and Bob Ferreira said he leans toward "Invitation" as his choice.
- Bob Ferreira said in response to a question that the Four Freshmen much enjoy meeting fans immediately after a show, but wanted them to understand how important it was for the Freshmen to keep healthy and their voices in shape when they're touring so they're able to give each show their best. Thus, at times they may have to pass on meeting fans to avoid catching or passing on a "bug." He asked for understanding.
- To the surprise, and pleasure, of fans present, ex-Freshmen Greg Stegeman called from home just as "Fresh Talk" was ending to greet everyone and express regret at his having to miss the gathering. Rod Henley took the call on his cell phone and held it next to the mike so all in the room could hear him.

"What a great convention. I gotta tell you guys, usually there are people that say they are the biggest fans of this or that. Or they say they are the group's #1 fan (even though hundreds may claim it), but I do think Ray just might be our #1 fan. It's a close call with lots of our fans, but I may have to give it to Ray!

Thank you Chaz, Gael, Jim and any others involved in this year's convention. It was spectacular. Ever since the convention committee was formed years back, each convention has gotten better and better." — Curtis

#### Friday Night Scenes from Atlanta

Friday night's Four Freshman concert (separately reviewed in this issue) was the first of two performances by the Freshmen at the convention and featured the very hot 17-member Georgia-based GPC Jazz Ensemble to open the show. That group then did 11 numbers with the Freshmen. When GPC concluded, Bob Flanigan was first to jump up to lead the standing ovation for GPC.

Earlier, Bob jokingly requested during the show the Freshmen do 'Surfer Girl.' To Bob's surprise, and perhaps the audience's, the Freshmen complied with an improvised and abbreviated instrumental version kicked off by Curtis Calderon.

In announcing the "Five Trombone" arrangements being premiered that night, Bob Ferreira told the audience the Freshmen also were working on an arrangement of "Thriller" (the Michael Jackson smash hit). The audience sat silent (perhaps stunned?) before Bob cracked a smile. (In today's terminology, we'd just been punked.)

The Four Freshmen opened the second half of the show with an informal improvised instrumental version of 'Tequila' to help speed everyone's getting seated. It accomplished its purpose.

#### **Other Atlanta Scenes**

Ross Barbour told fans gathered to sing Friday at the afternoon "Wannabees" session that "In This Whole Wide World," the next song up, was written on a notecard, then tossed on the floor by the composer who was working with them after he had played only a few bars on the piano. He apparently didn't think it was of Freshmen caliber. The Freshmen, however, immediately took to it and collectively rushed to pick the card up, saving it for what become one of the group's best-loved tunes.

Freshmen lead singer Brian Eichenberger was spotted around noon Friday heading out of the hotel for a run and sporting his new summer look: short (and naturally dark) hair.

Thursday's opening event was a "jam session" open to all attendees. On stage were a number of talented musicians, among them Bob Flanigan, Ross Barbour, Autie Goodman, Rod Henly and Ray Brown, all making appearances to sing (Ross, Autie and Rod) or just speak (Bob and Ray).

Ross sang one number, 'Georgia,' with lyrics he altered to salute the convention host state and Four Freshmen fans.

Flanigan told the audience in his brief comments -- which included his thanks to them for all of their support-- 'I don't sing anymore, play anymore (pause) but I DRINK!' As the audience laughed, he then held up a glass of water.

Ray, who served as the evening's MC, told those urging him to sing that he no longer does due to a bout with mouth cancer.

The Freshmen's Saturday night show in Atlanta enduing the three-day convention, was sold out as of early Friday.

A popular gathering place for fans during the day was the "Club 113," a hotel meeting room used during the convention for socializing, perusing offerings at the Music Mart table and tables of other record dealers, talking with hosts of the 2010 convention about plans for that Annapolis, Maryland, event, bidding in a multi-day silent auction for mainly Four Freshmen items as a fund-raiser for the Atlanta convention budget, picking up convention apparel ordered in advance, and just snacking on free popcorn. (The original Club 113 stood in Ft. Wayne, at 113 Washington Blvd., where the Freshmen, then called the Toppers, had their first professional gig.)

A number of fans arrived over several days before the official Thursday start of the convention, renewing friendships from past conventions and just visiting in the area. Four Freshmen "Ambassador" Ross Barber often could be found in the lobby near the hotel entrance daytime on Wednesday and Thursday, warmly welcoming arriving attendees as he does every year. ### **FIVE TROMBONES REVISITED**

The Freshmen had been working on Four Freshmen and Five Trombone charts for recording at September's West Coast Jazz Party. Those performances may comprise the next FF Group 22 CD. Lucky convention attendees got to hear them first.

Voices and Brass, recorded by Group 3 with arranger/conductor Pete Rugolo in 1959, could have been called The Four Freshmen and a Gang of Trombones. As many as nine 'bones played on some tracks. Five played on the classic track Candy and that chart kicked off the exciting Five Trombones segment. The GPC trombone section, augmented by a fifth player, sounded a tad tentative at the start but that didn't last long.

Our Love Is Here to Stay made 400 people remember just how thrilling the Four Freshmen sound can be. Here were the four voices across five notes in the chord. Here were the second and third voices moving through the chord, the first and fourth voices anchoring at each end and the trombone choir providing rock solid backing. It was an absolutely stunning take on a chart that sounded utterly, well, fresh, even though we'd all heard it hundreds of times in our lives. Whew!

The Freshmen and trombones swung through Somebody Loves Me and You Made Me Love You with a great sound mix allowing us to hear bass and piano driving the rhythm section. By the time the guys got to the famous break before the bridge, "Doo Wah, Doo Wah, Pete Rugolo" it was obvious to every listener that these arrangements sound as contemporary today as they did when we fell in love with Four Freshmen and Five Trombones.

The entire band came back for Route 66, the classic Freshmen favorite that also first showed up on Voices and Brass. The Freshmen were cookin', the band was smokin' and the whole gang rocked down that familiar highway. Bobby Troup was smiling somewhere.

From the start of the show it was apparent the Freshmen were pumped. It was also obvious that an undeclared cutting contest was going on among the trumpet players on stage. Band leader Greg McLean was good as were members of his trumpet section but the knowing smiles from Bob, Vince and Brian left no doubt that they knew what was happening. Building contractors should have been standing by because Curtis Calderon blew the roof off the ballroom of the Crowne Plaza at Ravinia that night.

Veteran sound mix master Erich Bucholtz again had the music going great. Legendary retired FF member and arranger Greg Stegeman painstakingly transcribed the original Five Trombones charts and the convention audience came prepared to love every minute of it. When the night was over a lot of fans who have heard a lot of Four Freshmen concerts over a lot of years were of like mind: this night just might have been the greatest FF concert any of us had ever heard. # Friday's Big Noise from Ravinia

### It was a blast from the past! It was a flight to the future!

It was Friday night at the "Blue Moon" convention in Atlanta when the Four Freshmen returned to those thrilling Kenton band Road Show days and then moved us forward with only a hint of nostalgia as they reintroduced the Four Freshmen and Five Trombones.

The Freshmen used the Road Show opener, Day In - Day Out, backed by the excellent 17 piece GPC Jazz Ensemble. The Freshmen did it with the Kenton band nearly 50 years ago and that recording still produces a thrill, swinging harder than any other live track by any Freshmen group. Group 22's vocal harmonies were impeccable this night. They took the song at a slightly slower pace than the original recording and the GPC band isn't as crisp as the Kenton band but, then, neither is anyone else. Michael Beisner once told me Day in - Day Out is one of the toughest of all FF charts. Group 22 made it look easy.

Poinciana had a somewhat quicker tempo than either the original recording or other live recordings of the song by FF groups, including Group 22, through the years. From the opening attack, it was obvious that the guys and the band were going to absolutely nail the chart. A superb sound mix added to the pleasure.

And then came a surprise. If I Had You was an obscure ballad, best known by Frank Sinatra's 1947 recording, when the Freshmen put it on their In Session CD. On the CD the chart became an absolute cooker. In concert, however, the guys have taken it back to its ballad days. It's OK but a disappointment to fans who love the uptempo Bourbon Street meets Beale Street version on In Session. But that Friday night we were introduced to yet a third FF incarnation of If I Had You. The new Big Band chart from Patrick Murray proves "it don't mean a thing if it ain't got that swing!"

A super walking bass line propelled the music forward from the start. The chart has hot brass and swinging saxes. Brian Eichenberger's vocal solo put back some of that Memphis grit. Bob Ferrera said it was only the second time the guys have done the new chart live. It showed in a couple of somewhat sloppy vocal attacks but again the harmonies were great. Patrick Murray, a musician from Los Angeles by way of Austin, Texas and the Manhattan School of Music, is a most welcome addition to the Four Freshmen family of great arrangers! Bob summed it up best: "Great chart!"

Speaking of great arrangers and arrangements, Greg's Stegeman's Walking My Baby Back Home came next. Wikipedia lists 75 artists who have recorded this song since 1930, with Nat Cole and Johnnie Ray having notable hit versions in 1952. The Freshmen are the ONLY vocal group to record it. That distinction may be permanent because it would be tough to top this chart.

The intricate vocal harmonies of Fools Rush In amaze as much today as they did almost 50 years ago when Ken Albers wrote the chart. The song sounded marvelous on The Freshmen Year in 1960 and sounds super when Group 22 does it self-contained today. The Big Band accompaniment adds a special touch, perhaps because the song started as a Big Band hit for both Glenn Miller and Tommy Dorsey. Miller had Ray Eberle's vocal. Dorsey featured a skinny

guy from Hoboken named Sinatra. The GPC Jazz Ensemble made the song shine. Repeated listening suggests Fools wasn't Group 22's best performance of the evening, but saying that is akin to complaining when Babe Ruth only hit a triple.


