He often came to my departure gate to say hello, as he worked at SAS airlines in Copenhagen airport. One day, while I was on a ferry boat from Malm, Sweden to Copenhagen, I heard It Never Occurred To Me by The Four Freshmen on background music. I think that was my first experience to hear The Four Freshmen as background music. I was so excited and wanted to tell this story to somebody. Later, I was walking inside the big airport terminal building. Somebody touched my shoulder from behind. Of course, it was Palle. He was the very right person to tell my recent experience in the ferry boat. I tried to let him know my flight back to Japan in advance.

Sue Barbour decided to tell us what happened to the Four Freshmen in 1956, since this was a particularly eventful year for them. In January, the Barbours bought a house. In March, Ken Albers replaced Ken Errair. That was the year that the Four Freshmen did the tour with the Ted Heath Orchestra. Notables in the lineup included June Christy and Nat King Cole. That was the tour when Nat King Cole got attacked by a deranged concert attendee in Mississippi. It was unnerving to him and he was visibly shaken, though he recovered from the attack alright.

April 19 was Don Barbour's birthday. At the party for Don, Ted Heath (from England) was asked what impressed him the most about the United States. His reply was, "The size of Texas."

The record company had been saving the Freshmen release of *Graduation Day* to have it come out closer to graduation time. Word came down that the Rover Boys were about to release a recording of this song, so the record company got the Four Freshmen version released really quickly.

At a Salt Lake amusement park, Ross was having trouble trying to play badminton and collapsed. Three weeks later, he was diagnosed with type 1

diabetes. He was in the hospital for two weeks and only weighed 124 pounds when he got out.

1956 was also the year that Elvis was on the Ed Sullivan Show for the first time. Ray Anthony had a TV show and

the Four Freshmen were on it. In Sue's words, it was not a big success. According to her, they had to do "dumb" choreography, which didn't work, and they ended up quitting the show.

In order to stay employed, the Four Freshmen started doing one-nighter college tours. This proved to be a big success for them. The college kids loved the Four Freshmen and the Freshmen sound.

Sue ended her comments by saying that in 1957 they sold their house, moved to California, and became Californians.

Nancy Albers, widow of Ken Albers, shared her memories with us next. She had never traveled with the Freshmen because she always stayed home with the kids. The first time she did, it was a 17-day cruise, which included their three children. The Freshmen party were the only passengers on board besides the crew. They went through the Panama Canal on this cruise.

She also related how Ken was not a big talker, especially on stage. The one reply the other guys could get out of him was his famous response to any question: "My girdle's killing me." Nancy said it's on several CDs.

Bill Comstock regaled us with a tale that he thought was particularly humorous. A friend asked him after a performance if the Freshmen would come to his

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
