REINCARNATION OF FRANKLIN CD AT THE METROPOLIS

The essence of the Live at the Franklin (Tennessee) Theater CD (the Four Freshmen's newest) came alive for the rockin' sold out audience at the 280-seat Metropolis Theater in downtown Arlington Heights, Illinois on Saturday evening, June 28, 2914.

The Franklin CD is the first to introduce freshman Freshmen Stein (pronounced Stain) Malvey to the Freshmen afficionados. As you "now know," Stein sings the second vocal and plays a compelling lead guitar. As a surprise for him, his favorite Ohio cousins clapped their praises from the audience. As a surprise for them, they discovered his virtuosity. (After the concert, the cousins told this Freshmen Society member they were aware Stein was a gifted guitarist since junior high. But they didn't know, he could sing!)

The 24-tune set list featured an even split of 12 songs in the first half and 12 in the last. The list was intersected by a lucrative intermission for the group. At the break, the CD and DVD sales were particularly brisk because of a pricing incentive. The initial purchase was priced at \$20. The second or more purchases were \$10 apiece.

New to this writer was Brian Eichenberger's solo on the classic Hank Williams honky tonk ballad *Cold*, *Cold Heart*. Warm receptions were given for Bob Ferreira's brush-smacks on the drum head and high hat on *Rain*, *Another You*, and particularly *Pick Up Your Tears*. Curtis Calderon commanded the room with his customary flugelhorn and trumpet solos following the group's initial 32-bar renditions of *Route 66*, *Day by Day*, *Charmaine* and FF goldens and homage to the Freshmen originals. At the close, the Freshmen were given a standing ovation.

Why it took ten years for the four to make a return appearance at The Metropolis is anyone's guess. (This writer had been approaching the theater booker for years.)

It was great working the sales table with Will Cochran, the faithtful Illinois Freshmen Society representative, again. Ironically, the last time was for the concert a few years ago for the Northwest Suburban Community Concert Association in Arlington Heights.

Maybe the next Freshmen CD will be entitled Live at the Metropolis.
