IVI manages several artists and with even a modest staff, our folks can quickly overwhelm their ability to respond. We suggest that future referrals include specifics about the venue, a contact person with phone and address information. Then submit this information to me....I will advise you if we require further information and then I will forward to IVI. We have a good relationship with IVI and I confer with them often. Please do not call IVI with such requests or inquiries.

Additionally, please do not call IVI and request travel and/or hotel information about Freshmen appearances. This information will no longer be provided.


LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dick Reynolds, The Recommendable Yutaka Alaki (Japan)

In the last issue of Fresh News (Vol. 15, No. 1), Ms. Ann Smith wrote the following as Bob Flanigan's words: "Bob said that, to him, three of the all-time great arrangers are: Pete Rugolo, Kenny Albers, and Greg Stegeman."

My opinion is that Dick Reynolds is more recommendable than Rugolo because of his many Freshmen arrangements and the nature of the "Sound." The Frosh Sound had been created and developed by them (including Albers, Comstock and Stegeman) and Reynolds. The arrangements of Reynolds are directly on target with the Frosh. He treated the song for the Frosh and was honestly "going to school on Frosh" (FN Vol. 12, No. 3).

Compared with Reynolds, Rugolo's arrangements are on a different stream...not the Freshmen. Ross mentioned in his book "Now You Know" the time that Don tossed a glass against the wall when they were rehearsing 5 Trombones charts. The reason was the difficulty and irregularity (and a feeling of wrongness or curiosity, I assume).

Last year, the Mosaic 55 selection offered us some never prereleased numbers. One of them is "Laura" performed at 1950 (and bewitched me with charming bell-tones). Please see Ex. 1, typical Frosh arrangement. To be compared with this, the well-known "Laura," performed at 1950 on Voices In Brass, is as Ex. 2 and Ex. 3. These were arranged by Reynolds based on Rugolo's arrangement. Ex. 2 is orthodox arrangement of the Frosh and Ex. 3 is not so. Ex. 3 is pre-singing of following notes of the trombone choir. I guess this is Rugolo's idea, because it's often heard in the other numbers like Angel Eyes, Autumn Leaves, etc. They are Rugolo. Back to Ex. 3, I regard this as an unnecessary phrase. Too difficult to sing and no one can probably notice the effort of the singers. (SEE PAGE 5)

Reynolds offered many beautiful and suitable arrangements since 1951 (FN Vol. 3, No. 4). Bob Flanigan especially names "In Love" and "Love Lost" as Reynolds' best ballad writing (FN Vol. 3, No. 6). Greg Stegeman told us "Voices In Love - with this album Dick Reynolds established himself as probably the most appropriate arranger for the Freshmen." (FN Vol. 4, No. 4)
